

Butterflies in Surrey

- 43 species in Surrey (59 in UK)
- 17 Habitat Specialists (HS): restricted to colonies within a few habitat types & rarely fly far from them eg Adonis Blue, Chalk Hill Blue, Silver-spotted Skipper, Small Blue, Silver-studded Blue, Wood White
- 26 Wider-countryside species (WC): either use a wide variety of habitats or are very mobile & travel widely round the countryside including coming into gardens, laying & nectaring as they go

Habitat Specialists (HS) in gardens (7): Dingy Skipper, Small Blue, Brown Hairstreak, Chalk Hill Blue, Silver-washed Fritillary, Dark Green Fritillary, Purple Emperor (6 in my garden)

Wider-countryside species (WC) in gardens (25):

Large Skipper, Small Skipper, Essex Skipper, Brimstone, Large White, Small White, Greenveined White, Orange-tip, Small Copper, Purple Hairstreak, White-letter Hairstreak, Holly Blue, Brown Argus, Common Blue, Painted Lady, Red Admiral, Peacock, Small Tortoiseshell, Comma, Small Heath, Speckled Wood, Marbled White, Ringlet, Gatekeeper, Meadow Brown (23 in my garden)

Why attract butterflies to your garden:

- Pollinators
- Good indication of the health of the environment
- Gardens can be 'stepping stones' for species, places to nectar and breed eg Small Blue,
 Common Blue, Brown Hairstreak
- Can learn more about their behaviour
- Can photograph stages
- Good for mental health



Join Butterfly Conservation's Garden Butterfly Survey https://gardenbutterflysurvey.org

I have recorded butterflies in my garden for the Garden Butterfly Survey for 8 years, with 29 species in total:

6 Habitat Specialist (HS) species (marked with *) and 23 Wider Countryside (WC) species





A garden as a habitat for butterflies should have:

- Plants for larvae to feed on or larval host plants (LHP) which are UK native stock of local origin if possible eg Common Nettle, Common Bird's-foot-trefoil, Cock's-foot, Blackthorn, Buckthorn, Holly, Ivy, plum, Cherry Plum
- Places to pupate eg golden skippers at base of grasses, Small Blue & Common Blue under foodplant with ants, whites a wall or fence
- Flowers for nectar choose plants suitable for soil in garden eg Wild Marjoram on chalk
- Right mix of sunlight and shelter for species concerned
- No use of pesticides or fertilisers
- Different areas all have potential
 - Lawn with a meadow area with Yellow Rattle, Common Bird's-foot-trefoil, Dandelion, Red Clover, Daisy, Bulbous Buttercup, Selfheal, Common & Greater Knapweed, Oxeye Daisy, Field Scabious, Cowslip, Primrose, Kidney Vetch, Common Ragwort
 - Flower borders eg Wild Marjoram, lavender, Michaelmas-daisy, Verbena bonariensis, Sedum spectabile, Greater Periwinkle
 - Shrubs eg Bramble, Wild Privet, Ivy, Holly, Buddleia, Buckthorn
 - Hedge eg. Beech, mixed native with Blackthorn, Hawthorn, Cherry Plum, Field Maple, Hazel
 - Trees eg Pedunculate Oak, lime, plum, Cherry Plum, apple
 - Sunny area for basking eg patio, wood pile
 - Pond/wet area for 'mudpuddling' butterflies
- Right management to avoid disturbance during vulnerable early stages so avoid mowing, dead-heading or digging up plants which may hold eggs, larvae or pupae. In 'meadow area' mow once at end of September when seeds have set and take off cuttings.

Yellow Rattle (Rhinanthus minor) 17/06/2016, the 'meadow maker'

- An annual and a hemi-parasite on grasses, suppressing growth & allowing wild flowers to flourish eg Red Clover (*Trifolium pratense*), Common Bird's-foot-trefoil (*Lotus corniculatus*), Selfheal (*Prunella vulgaris*)
- Source from a friend's garden, or Emorsgate Seeds https://wildseed.co.uk/ (£12/100g, need about 4g/m², so for an area of 6 m² need about 24g costing about £3
- Collect seeds in August & sow immediately, needs a period of vernalisation (frost) to germinate

Our garden is on chalk.
In the 'meadow area' of our lawn, as the Yellow Rattle suppresses the grass and drops more seeds each year, more of the wild plants are flourishing:

- Common Bird's-foot-trefoil
- Red Clover
- Selfheal
- Bulbous Buttercup
- Perforate St John's-wort
- Kidney Vetch
- Wild Marjoram
- Common Ragwort
- Cowslip
- Germander Speedwell
- Oxeye Daisy
- Daisy
- Dandelion

Brimstone (WC) male 05/08/2016

- LHP: Buckthorn (*Rhamnus cathartica*)
- Nectar sources: Dandelion, Greater Periwinkle, Buddleia, Cowslip, Primrose, Wild Teasel, Mouse-earhawkweed, Bramble, Common Knapweed
- Has a long proboscis about 15mm long
- Often first to appear in spring, has hibernated as an adult







Orange-tip (WC) male 13/04/2017 & 14/05/2018 and female 18/04/2017

- LHP: Cuckooflower (Cardamine pratensis),
 Garlic Mustard (Alliaria petiolata), Hedge
 Mustard, Charlock, Honesty, Dame's-violet,
 Wallflower, Wild Rocket
- Nectar sources: Cuckooflower, Greater
 Periwinkle, Herb Robert, Field forget-me-not,
 Bluebell

LHP: Common Bird's-foot-trefoil, Greater Bird's-foot-trefoil & Horseshoe Vetch Other nectar sources: Oxeye Daisy, Mouse-ear-hawkweed, Selfheal, Bugle, Common Chickweed, Heather, Ground-ivy Conservation Priority: High

- LHP: Cock's-foot (*Dactylis* glomerata), Timothy (*Phleum* pratense)
- Nectar sources: Red Clover Lesser Hawkbit, Buddleia, Common Knapweed

Gatekeeper (WC) nectaring on Wild Marjoram 06/08/2016 & mating pair 20/07/2020

- LHP: grasses eg. Cock's-foot, Sheep's-fescue, Red Fescue, Perennial Rye Grass
- Nectar sources: Wild Marjoram, Bramble, Common Ragwort








Small Tortoiseshell (WC) nectaring on Wild Marjoram 06/07/2015

- LHP: Common Nettle (Urtica dioica) in sun
- Nectar sources: Wild Marjoram, Dandelion, Butterfly Stonecrop (Sedum spectabile),
 Michaelmas-daisy, Buddleia, Aubretia
- Trend: reduced numbers in the south-east since 1990s. *Sturmia bella*, a parasitoid first recorded in Britain in 1998, is one factor.

- LHP: Common Nettle (Urtica dioica) in sun, Hop
- Nectar sources: Wild Marjoram, Dandelion, Aubretia, Sedum spectabile, Michaelmas-daisy, Buddleia, Red Valerian



Painted Lady (WC) nectaring on Oxeye Daisy (Leucanthemum vulgare) 11/06/2019

- LHP: thistles, Common Nettle, Hollyhock, Globe Artichoke, Viper's Bugloss, Common Mallow,
 Musk Mallow
- Nectar sources: Ivy, lavender, Sedum spectabile, Michaelmas-daisy, Buddleia, Red Valerian







Comma (WC) nectaring on Ivy flowers 21/09/2016

LHP: Common Nettle (Urtica dioica) in sun, Hop, Black Currant, Red Currant, Gooseberry, Hazel, willows, elms

Nectar sources: Ivy, Bramble flowers & fruit, Wild Marjoram, Sedum spectabile







Small Blue (HS) female laying on Kidney Vetch 26/05/2020

- LHP: Kidney Vetch (Anthyllis vulneraria)
- Nectar sources: Kidney Vetch, Common Bird's-foot-trefoil
- Trend: expanding along the Chalk thanks to conservation efforts.

Conservation Priority: High

GB Red List: Near Threatened








Dark Green Fritillary (HS) nectaring on Buddleia 30/07/2015

- LHP: Hairy Violet (Viola hirta), Common Dog Violet (Viola riviniana)
- Nectar sources: Buddleia, Common Ragwort, Bramble, thistles
- Trend: a resurgence from about 2007 has accelerated and the species is now abundant along the Downs, and has colonised west of Guildford.



Brown Hairstreak (HS) female basking & laying on Victoria Plum 25/08/2017 & Cherry Plum 01/09/2017

- LHP: Blackthorn (*Prunus* spinosa), Victoria Plum (*Prunus* domestica 'Victoria'), Cherry Plum (*Prunus* cerasifera), Bullace (*Prunus* domestica subsp. instititia)
- Nectar sources: aphid honeydew on Ash, rotten fruit in garden, Creeping Thistle, Wild Angelica
- Trend: clearly increasing its range
